
The Good Shepherd

Location: The south wall of the south transept

Theme: Jesus as the good shepherd

Scripture: John 10:11



I am the good shepherd; the good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep.

Also in this window are two depictions of the world. To the left is the globe wrapped by a snake, to symbolize the world under the domination of sin, as expressed in Revelation 12:9: "that ancient serpent, who is called the Devil and Satan, the deceiver of the whole world." To the right is the world yoked to the cross, as

expressed in Ephesians 2:16: *"Christ reconciles us. . .to God in one body through the cross, thereby bringing the hostility to an end."*

Art Glass Dedication The Good Shepherd window was donated by Bessie Fern Luther (1886-1965) in memory of her husband, Martin A. Luther (1886-1950). Mr. Luther worked for the Pure Oil Company. His wife was a homemaker and active on the congregation's Christomathean Bible Class and the South End Division of the Ladies' Aid Society.

Storm Window: The storm window was provided through the anonymous gift by a couple in the congregation.


The Word of God Windows

Location: The east wall of the south transept

Theme: The Word of God

Scripture: Psalm 119:1-5





Thy word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path.

In the window to the right, we see a Biblical lamp, the type that would have burned olive oil. To the left is an open Bible, the concrete record of God's Word to us. Notice that behind the Bible is depicted a white lily, which is the symbol of Easter.

Art Glass Dedication: The Lamp window was donated by Matilda Hoffman in memory of her parents.

Storm Window: Nettie Buser donated the storm window in memory of her husband, John Buser (1914-1980). John's life and work are described in the dedication to this booklet. The lamp is also a symbol of education. Nettie Buser was by profession, a teacher.

Art Glass Dedication: The open Bible window was donated in memory of Helen Wintermute (1895-1950) by her daughter, Marian.

Storm Window: The storm window was donated through the general gifts of the congregation.
